Those who answered don't know were excluded from published voting intention figures but not from the survey. 7% were thus excluded from published voting intention figures.			
2PP calculation method	Calculated according to preference flows based on respondent allocated preferences. Respondents who indicated they would not give a preference and those who said they were undecided between Labor and Liberal/Nationals were assumed to not give a preference.
